

Gaining Ground Initiative Participant Manual

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Program Overview

Gaining Ground is a two-year initiative, managed by the National Network of Public Health Institutes (NNPHI) and supported by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation (RWJF), that will develop sustainable, statewide systems to catalyze public health accreditation and support performance improvement in local, tribal, and state health departments in seven states.

Gaining Ground provides \$150,000 and individualized coaching to state coalitions in Colorado, California, Iowa, Nebraska, New Jersey, North Dakota, and Utah. Each state coalition is comprised of state, local, and tribal health departments, and other key stakeholders, such as public health institutes and schools of public health.

The purpose of the Gaining Ground Initiative is to leverage existing resources and relationships, amplify them with funding and technical assistance, and create additional momentum and progress towards the pursuit of national accreditation through the Public Health Accreditation Board (PHAB) at the state, local, and tribal level. This Participant Manual outlines the requirements for and the support available to the seven Gaining Ground Initiative coalitions for the duration of the grant period, from June 1, 2014 through May 31, 2016.

Technical Assistance

The following forms of technical assistance (TA) will be available to Gaining Ground participants:

- 1. State Coalition Advisor: Each state coalition will be assigned an expert advisor to support the development and implementation of the project work plan, and facilitate connections to existing resources and expertise. Advisor support will be provided both from a distance (web, phone) and in-person. In-person support will include:
 - a. one to two site visits and
 - b. on-site support during the three Open Forums of the Community of Practice for Public Health Improvement [COPPHI]).

Your advisor is a key resource related to your work. She will be in frequent contact with you, via a schedule and format that works for your team. Your advisor can provide direct technical assistance to your team, or she will connect you to resources/persons that can provide technical assistance. Advisors will also be in frequent communication with each other and serve as core members of the NNPHI project team. In this role, they will be able to help draw connections across all Gaining Ground states to identify opportunities for shared learning.

In the first three months, your advisor will provide direct support to the development of your state's work plan and budget, which are due **July 31, 2015**.

NNPHI will provide a teleconference line to enable conferences between the state coalition and their advisor. Advisors are also encouraged to connect with state coalitions utilizing free or low-cost video technology such as Skype. In order to maximize the effectiveness of the Advisor/state coalition relationship, NNPHI strongly recommends that a schedule for calls/web conferences be set at the beginning of the program.

What Should I Expect from my Advisor?

- Technical expertise: The provision of incremental education/training.
- Connections to resources: The identification of resources (e.g., specific tools, frameworks, etc.) that will be useful to your work.
- Objective input: The provision of objective input that will help provoke critical thinking and a deeper understanding of the QI process.

- Real experience: The provision of information and guidance as you go through the improvement process.
- Clear expectations: The provision of information to help you be clear about what comes next (e.g., when is the next call/communication, etc., what is my homework, etc.)
- Regular check-ins scheduled in advance, preferably at the beginning of the project

What is Expected of Me/y Coalition?

- Accept the Advisor's guidance and be open to feedback.
- Ask your Advisor if you do not understand something.
- Be prepared for and participate in the process with your Advisor (participate in the calls).
- Share your work with the Advisor (even if it's not where you think it should be) the Advisor is here to help you.
- 2. COPPHI Open Forum: NNPHI promotes shared learning among a broad range of local, state, territorial and tribal health department representatives; researchers; public health institutes; universities; national public health organizations; funders; policymakers; and government agencies by holding national meetings that focus on performance and quality improvement and accreditation, called the *Open Forum for Quality Improvement in Public Health*. Several members from the selected state coalitions will be supported to attend the Open Forum scheduled for June 12-13, 2014, as well as one Open Forum in 2015, and one Open Forum in 2016. The precise number of persons to be supported will be determined at a later date. The COPPHI Open Forum meetings are funded by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation.
- **3. Web Conferences:** A series of web conferences will be provided as an opportunity for the coalitions to share and learn with each other, as well as to learn from other state coalitions that have successfully created a sustainable infrastructure to support accreditation readiness and performance and quality improvement. The schedule and content for the webinars will be designed with input from the seven coalitions.
- 4. Leader Training: The National Association of County and City Health Officials (NACCHO) will offer a module for leadership training focused on leadership strategies for building and sustaining performance and quality improvement initiatives in their departments (e.g. accreditation, performance management systems, organizational cultures of quality improvement, etc.). The training will be aimed at health directors, approximately 2-4 hours in duration, and should be added onto existing meetings hosted within the state. NACCHO will work with selected states to understand the state's context and tailor training content accordingly.
- **5. Shared Email List (Listserv):** To facilitate networking among sites, all program participants will be able to ask questions and connect with each other via an online group/email list. The type of list (e.g., linked-in group, google group, etc.) will be determined with participant feedback.

- **6. Templates:** Sites will be provided templates for:
 - <u>Press releases</u> to announce selection to participate in Gaining Ground
 *this is optional, should sites wish to promote their selection to participate in this program
 - Project work plans
 - Periodic progress reports (approximately every 6 months) (coming soon)

7. Online Resources:

- a. "Gaining Ground Participants Page:" A section of the NNPHI website will be dedicated to resources specifically for sites participating in the program.
- b. <u>Public Health Quality Improvement Exchange</u>: The Public Health Quality Improvement Exchange (PHQIX.org) is an online community that houses QI projects implemented by health departments. Gaining Ground participants are encouraged to access PHQIX and share your work on the site as applicable.
- c. Access and submission capability to the <u>Public Health Improvement Toolkit</u>, an online collection of tools such as archived trainings, sample QI products, templates, and related resources. (All the tools are submitted by public health practitioners through their own efforts to implement performance improvement activities and prepare for national voluntary accreditation.)
- d. <u>Compendium of Latest Resources</u>: NNPHI has compiled a matrix with links to technical resources. The compendium is available on the Gaining Ground Participants page, and is also made available during the kick-off meeting. The purpose of the matrix is to provide initial information as a starting point; we hope that as we engage in our work together, you will add useful resources that you encounter to the matrix.

Reporting Requirements

- a. Work plans: Coalitions will develop work plans over the first three months of the grant with the assistance of their Advisor. These work plans should respond to the state's needs for advancing accreditation preparation and performance and QI activity within the state. Potential activities might include; providing small grants to health departments to participate in an in-state learning collaborative to prepare for accreditation and perform self-assessments against the PHAB standards; providing trainings at state-wide or regional meetings; or other technical assistance support to meet specific standards for PHAB such as an agency strategic plan, community health assessment and improvement plan, performance management plan, etc. In addition, work plans must:
 - Reach and/or include all health departments who wish to participate in the efforts.
 - Include baseline and targets for the number of health departments that will participate in each of the planned activities, and track the number of health departments that have an enhanced readiness to apply for accreditation (those that have submitted a statement of intent and those that have submitted an accreditation application.).
 - Develop a viable plan to leverage other resources and sustain activities to promote accreditation and QI after the award concludes.

- b. Final Budgets: Final budgets and budget narratives should accompany the work plan.
- c. Periodic Progress Reports: NNPHI will develop an evaluation plan for Gaining Ground based in part on the final state coalition work plans. It is anticipated that progress reporting will be required for evaluation purposes as well as program monitoring. NNPHI will be in regular communication with coalitions as the evaluation plan is solidified and reporting requirements developed; however, do not hesitate to reach out if you have any questions.

Funding and Budgeting Policy

\$150,000 will be awarded in 4 installments. Please refer to your contract for details regarding the payment schedule. Please note: Lead organizations must submit an invoice per the directions in the contract in order to receive payments.

Award funds may be used for; project staff salaries, consultant fees, data collection and analysis, meetings, supplies, project-related travel, communications/marketing, and project supplies. Funds may not be used for; lobbying activities, ongoing general operating expenses or existing deficits, items for which third-party reimbursement is available, endowments, or capital costs(including construction, renovation, or equipment).
