In response to this need, in September 2014, the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA), with support from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), re-designed its Public Health Training Center (PHTC) model to serve a modern public health workforce. Participants in this session will learn about the new public health training delivery model, including what resources and services are available in your area to support training and workforce development.
